
MESSAGE FROM YOUR EDITOR


Milt visited the museum in March 2022 and posed holding a picture of him being honored at a Tribute Luncheon in February 2019.




CONDOLENCES, cont.

Our condolences also go to the family of Verlin Alderton who died Oct. 18 at the age of 89. His career was with Moore Business forms but in his retirement, he was a volunteer with the Bella Vista Baptist Church and helped us obtain the Paul Parish wood sculptures which Paul had originally donated to the church but later were put in storage. We now have two of those on display in the Cooper Room. (We set up that sculpture exhibit after obtaining the Settler's Cabin in 2019. The cabin was originally saved from destruction by Paul Parish in the 1970s, when Cooper Communities began to develop the Highlands area. Paul used the cabin as a sculpture studio behind his house on Lake Avalon.)

We learned in October that John Cole died on Sept. 13 at his home in the Boston area. A native of Tulsa, he went to Harvard University and settled in that area. An excerpt from his obituary reads, "John also taught historic preservation at Harvard and the University of Arkansas and founded the Peel Mansion Museum in Bentonville. John spent time most summers of his life at the resort area Bella Vista, an annual gathering spot for family and friends and home to the Cole family's adored Hagler Cottage, a 1920's era cabin." We thank nearby cottage owners Nan Hughes and Margaret Holcomb for their donation to our museum in memory of John.





JIM WOZNIAK'S RETIREMENT FROM PUBLIC SERVICE

According to the December 11 issue of the Weekly Vista, Jim Wozniak announced his retirement from public service effective at the end of his current term on City Council. Jim was our speaker for our annual membership meeting at the museum on March 15, 2020, the last day we were open before closing for seven months due to Covid. He brought with him for display that day this old New York City police call box that he had received as a retirement present, showing all the badges and medals he received over his career of nearly four decades in law enforcement. Jim already had several years in law enforcement in Wisconsin before moving to Bella Vista and joining the Bella Vista division of the Benton County Sheriff's office in 1977. He was promoted to Chief Deputy in 1995. When we incorporated as a City at the end of 2006, he became our first police chief, a position he held for two years. Then he became a City Council member, a position he has now held for 14 years, so he has totaled 53 years in public service! Our congratulations and a big thanks to him for all he has done for Bella Vista.



BELLA VISTA CIVIL WAR ROUND TABLE

The Bella Vista Civil War Round Table continues to meet monthly at the museum on the first Thursday evening of each month at 7 p.m. Their speakers for the fall quarter of 2024 were Louisiana professor Dr. Gary Joiner who spoke in October about the Confederate defense of Shreveport, LA; local resident and Civil War re-enactor Russ Pennington who spoke in November about General Steele and the Camden expedition, which was the Arkansas component of the Red River Campaign in 1864, and retired professor Jane Johansen of Neosho MO, author of several books on the Civil War, whose topic in December was "New Fields of Adventure: The Writings of Lyman G. Bennett....." The December meeting concluded with the annual book giveaway where interested attendees could select from over 100 books on the Civil War donated by Chuck Pribbernow.

The calendar for 2025 and 2026 speakers is filled, and they are working on speakers for all of 2027.

The Round Table was started in May 2019 and except for a few months when Covid hit, it has met monthly since then. Its Mission Statement reads, "To educate about and stimulate interest in the period of history of the United States known as 'The American Civil War'. To promote historical, educational, and literary study and activities related to the Civil War, including events and circumstances related to the cause and effects of the War."

MUSEUM BURGLARY OCTOBER 26

Recognize this vehicle? On the night of Oct. 26, someone broke into the Bella Vista Historical Museum and took this safe which is a Bella Vista Time Capsule. The suspect vehicle looks to be a white Ford Flex. If you have any information, contact Det. King at 479-855-3771 or email aking@bellavistaar.gov.





We were quite upset that someone broke in through one of the back doors of the museum late Sat. evening, October 26. All he took was the time capsule that Jim Parsons, Frank Anderson and others set up in 2007 in honor of the City of Bella Vista's incorporation, and to be opened 100 years later, in 2107. Since the time capsule materials were in a safe, evidently the burglar assumed there was money inside. We don't know if he would have taken more items, but the security alarm went off after 60 seconds and he quickly left. Thankfully, Rosita's Restaurant next door to the museum had a camera that recorded his vehicle, a white Ford Flex, driving through about that time. A few days later, the police in nearby Tontitown pulled over a vehicle, which happened to be a white Ford Flex, because of a license plate problem and they discovered that the driver had a duffel bag full of the items from our time capsule. Detective Tony King of the Bella Vista police interviewed the guy but since he claimed to have bought those items from someone else, all he could be charged with at that time was a misdemeanor of receipt of stolen goods, and he was then released. A few days later, they were able to get a warrant for his arrest on a felony charge of burglary but he has not been found again. Detective King reviewed our museum visitor logs and found the guy's name on our log from a visit the day before the burglary so he obviously cased out the place then. Local TV stations interviewed Co-Presidents Xyta Lucas and Dale Phillips to help draw the public's attention to the burglary.

Our volunteer in charge of security, Jack Kellogg, has now spent many hours over the past two months improving our security set up. The first thing he did was to change the alarm timing so that it now goes off immediately when one of the back doors are opened instead of having a 60 second delay. With the help of electrician Jeremy Carter, several more cameras were installed inside and outside the museum building, then employees from Kinco Construction reinforced the two back doors so that a crowbar can no longer easily be slipped in to release the lock. They also removed the window from that back door so it is now a solid door.


The time capsule, stolen on Oct. 26, contained documents detailing the year Bella Vista became a city.



Volunteer Dustie Meads set up a GoFundMe to raise money to help pay for the cameras, the electrician's work and the reinforcement of the doors. We are very grateful to everyone who contributed to that fund, and especially to docent Angie Rader who made a major donation to bring us up to the total that we needed. While the contents were returned to us, the original safe was not recovered. We thank Jim Parsons for donating the cost of a replacement safe similar in appearance.

SOUTHWEST QUADRANT OF BELLA VISTA TOWN CENTER

Over the years, the complex in the southwest quadrant of Bella Vista's Town Center at the intersection of Highways 71 & 340 has served several purposes: Fire Dept, Security Dept (predecessor to the City's Police Dept.), POA offices and later City Hall. The Police Dept and POA offices are now in other locations. Today the complex is being expanded to give additional space to Fire Station #1 and to City offices. 
COMPOSER ALBERT E. BRUMLEY

Albert Brumley was a nearby neighbor to Bella Vista, having lived in Powell, Missouri, where he died in November 1977 at age 72. He was a composer and publisher, well known for his southern gospel music, and best known for his song "I'll Fly Away" which he wrote in 1929.

His granddaughter Betsy Brumley-Bernier and her husband Kevin have lived in Bella Vista since 2006. She and the <u>https://illflyawayfoundation.org</u> hosted a concert of Brumley music at the Cooper Chapel in September 2016.

His life story can be found in detail at <u>https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/5659883/albert-edward-brumley</u>.

The highway just over the line into Missouri, north of the intersection of 340 and 94, was dedicated to him. According to Findagrave, "His songs have been recorded by such legendary performers as Elvis Presley, Roy Acuff, Red Foley, Johnny Cash....and many other singers and quartets. 'I'll Fly Away' has been recorded well over 500 times....The first refrain (including the musical score) of his "I'll Meet You in the Morning" is engraved on his tombstone."





CHASE FOGLE FENCE

Ten years ago, Chase Fogle was looking for a project to earn his Eagle Scout award. The year before, the American Legion had built a big new building next door, and we needed a way to easily designate the property line between the properties. We are so thankful that Chase agreed to build a fence for us. The metal sign we ordered back then deteriorated over the years so this year his dad, Greg Fogle, replaced the sign for us, which was much appreciated!

Chase drew up his plans and then dug holes for the fence posts.








ORIGINAL RULES OF GOLF

Glen Whiting of Bella Vista was a recent visitor to the museum, at which time he donated a very large framed print shown at right of the "Articles & Laws in Playing the Golf". A plaque at the bottom reads:

> "The 13 Original Rules of Golf" Golf's most Significant Historical Document St. Andrews, Scotland 14th May 1754



Rules of Golf, signed by John Rattray Captain 1744-47 and 1751 with amendments by Thomas Boswell Captain 1758. The original is in National Library of Scotland. A thousand copies were made and distributed by Hon Co and are on display in the golf museum at St Andrews and club-houses of many old golf societies.



For centuries, the original rules were thought lost, but in 1937 they were rediscovered by Mr CB Clapcott on two pages at the back of a Minute Book of the Honourable Company. The pages contained thirteen Articles and the signature of John Rattray, as Captain. As he was 'Captain of the Golf' in 1744-1747 and 1751, we cannot be sure what the date of these rules is, but as they were copied verbatim for use in St Andrews in 1754, we can be sure they applied at this time.

According to various internet websites, the first known written set of rules were drafted by the Gentlemen Golfers of Leith, now known as the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers. The rules were originally known as the '13 Articles' and were implemented to govern the first Challenge for the Silver Club tournament played at Leith Links in Edinburgh, Scotland. The rules were drawn up at the request of the City of Edinburgh Council, who had presented the silver club prize and insisted there had to be rules for the competition. The competition was open to all gentlemen golfers in Britain, but only local players participated. Evidently there were no prior rules and maybe none would have been drawn up if not for the insistence of the Edinburgh Council. The rules were adopted a decade later for a similar Challenge played at St. Andrews. The rules appear in the St. Andrews Golfers' first minute book and were titled "Articles & Laws in Playing the Golf". The first Challenge at St. Andrews was played on May 14, 1754, and is now considered the start date of what would become the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews.

Over the years others took on the rules, adapted them, and played to their own rules before the formation of the R&A Rules Committee in 1897 began the modern era of golf that continues to this day. The R&A takes its name from The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, but in 2004 it became a separate entity from the golf club in order to focus on its governance role.

ANNUAL MEETING SCHEDULED FOR SUNDAY MARCH 16 AT 2 P.M.

While this is a referred to as a "membership" meeting because we have our annual election of officers, the public is always invited to attend. Our speaker this March will be Vanessa McKuin, director of the Cane Hill AR historic site and granddaughter of our beloved Constance Norton Waddell.

The year 2024 was an exciting one at the museum. Thanks to the efforts of our great volunteers and much community support, we were able to hold a number of successful special events. As a result, those events combined with our monthly Civil War Round Table meetings made our guest register numbers just keep piling up! We set a new record this year with 5700 visitors, which was almost 1400 more than 2023.

DUG HILL CHURCH

We have been trying to find ways to help the Dug Hill Cemetery Association raise funds for the renovation of their church building. It was built in 1936 and was getting to the point where it was no longer usable. A Work Detail Team from the Benton County Jail repainted the inside of the building using paint and supplies donated by Lowe's of Bentonville, a local Questers chapter, Trail of Tears, donated money to help repair some of the windows, and others also stepped up to help financially. We hosted a bake sale and silent auction for them at the museum on December 7-8 that was organized by Dug Hill trustee Sam Walker and his wife Kara. They raised over \$1,000!



REMEMBERING SADIE CUNNINGHAM

Sadie Cunningham was the last resident of the Cunningham family farm that stood along what is now Highway 71, and is why Cunningham Corner has that name at the intersection of Highway 71 and Riordan Rd. Sadie was born in western Kansas in the fall of 1894, and died at age 90 forty years ago in the fall of 1984. Her family moved to NW Arkansas 120 years ago in 1904, eleven years before the Bakers dammed up Little Sugar Creek to create Lake Bella Vista, so Sadie lived through the Baker years, the Linebarger years, the Keith years, and well into the Cooper years of Bella Vista's development. She became a school teacher at Dug Hill and never married.

VOLUNTEER DOCENTS
